CHRIST THE KING SUNDAY READINGS

Pilate orders an inscription to be placed on the cross: "Jesus the Nazorean the King of Jews" (John 19:19). Thus he announces the conclusion to which he has come about the man sent to him for interrogation and sentencing. The essential content of that interrogation appears in today's gospel. It is a strange interchange, where the accused acts as judge3. It is he not Pilate, who dominates the proceedings.

Does Pilate want to make Jesus admit his claim of royalty? Jesus does not deny the claim, but before answering the Roman procurator, he raises a preliminary question, as if he wanted this official to commit himself personally: "Are you saying this on your own?" Jesus continues, if you are speaking of royal title in the political sense in which my accusers take it, "My kingdom does not belong to this world." He has come into the world "to testify to the truth". It is as witness to the truth that he is king. It is for this he was born and for this he will die.

Jesus died to exorcise forever the temptation to reduce his gospel to one or another of political forces of society. Yet it remains a temptation for us to make the Church one of the kingdoms of this world. We must instead hope for a kingdom where the church will cease to be because God will be all in all.

Preparation to Receive Him

Silent and loving before Him, we are absolutely certain of His hidden reality; more certain than they who, in the days of His flesh, beheld and touched His body, which curtained the magnificence of the Godhead. With the eyes of faith, we see Him, not disfigured and clouded by the weaknesses of human nature, but shining with heavenly light in the grandeur of His beauty and in the perfection of His attributes.

To be so near our God, so rapt in love before Him, is to re-ceive His most coveted blessings. As, when He walked the earth, He went about doing good, so, from the tabernacle, He dispenses love, joy, mercy, and peace. All that concerns us is to Him too deep, too precious for words. He cannot there-fore send us away without some emanation of His humility, His obedience, His meekness, His self-denial. He best knows our needs, and will, if our faith is strong, supply them, or at least lighten the burden oppressing our hearts. And once within the circle of His divine attraction, we will leave Him either with our petitions answered, or with courage to suffer patiently.

In our visits, we can prepare ourselves to receive Him sacramentally. Poor, wretched, miserable, blind, and naked, we cannot alone make ourselves fit for the reception of our God. He must clothe our souls with the wedding garment of divine grace, and adorn them with virtue.

As we kneel before the eucharistic Savior, the Eternal Fa-ther will draw us closer to His Divine Son. Christ will so influ-ence us as to bring out the best that is in us. The Holy Spirit will calm us with the peace of God, and thus remove the ob-stacles to our loving advance in intimate conversation with the sacramental King. Our very nearness to Christ will dispel our diffidence at the thought of too hasty an approach to the God who has found sin among the angels. Breathing the spiri-tual air of the tabernacle, illumining our souls with the light reflected from His earthly dwelling, strengthening our wills for conflict with temptation, deepening our faith in His al-mighty power, and purifying our desire to love Him more un-selfishly — how can we better prepare ourselves to receive our God with a fervor that will ever inflame us with eager enthusi-asm in His service?

Maintaining A Prayerful Environment

The General Instructions of the Roman Missal (GIRM):

147 of the official 'how to celebrate Holy Mass' states that the people wait during the Preparation of the Gifts for the Priest to complete his invitation: Pray Brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father," before they stand and then say "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands...." This also is spelled out in our St. Joseph Pew Sunday Missal on P.21 that we Stand only after the Priests says the whole invitation.

Prayerful Pause of 30 full seconds after the 1st and 2nd Reading: The Lectionary Rubrics (Instructions) state: "A period of silence is observed after the reading." At the Abbey in Mission this is for 2 minutes. Here, in parish life, it will be a full 30 seconds. (At the Archbishop's Pastoral Visit at Assumption, Port Coquitlam, he was pleased with this practice and encouraged it)


Kids today are growing up with technology.

Request for Clothing & Non-Perishable Food

The Order of Malta is organizing Blue Drop Boxes in the back of the parish vestibule for the "Door is Open" Catholic charity.

The Door is Open is a drop-in ministry that provides food, clothing, counselling, shelter services, referrals, and a warm, safe environment in the heart of Vancouver's Downtown Eastside, a neighbourhood recognized for the highest concentration of the poorest urban population in the whole of Canada. It feeds up to 250 people everyday of the year. Right now, more people than usual need their assistance to survive and are counting on the Door is Open for their daily meals. At this time, they cannot allow volunteers to help them so they have to prepare the food themselves, mostly sandwiches.

They need non-perishable foods, such as canned tuna, pasta, pasta sauce, etc... You can also make a cash donation if you cannot go shopping. Seasonal, clean clothing is very welcome, especially socks, tshirts, warm jackets, sweaters, hoodies.

Most of us are sitting snug at home, with lots of food, warm and comfortable, we are lucky compare to others. Charity begins at home, this Vancouver.

If you have any reasonably worn clothing that can be reused and nonperishable food you can drop them in the blue boxes that should be available on:


