
22ND MAY 2022 SUNDAY READINGS

We find ourselves in virtually the same situation as the people for whom the fourth gospel was intended: faith alone assures us that the Risen One is still present in the world, but present in absence.

We believe that, in return to his Father, Christ does not cease to act. His death did not put an end to the spread of the gospel. By his death and rising Christ is present in a new way. The Spirit which had come down on him in the Jordan is now poured out upon all believers. We go forth to plant the seed of his word.

The time of presence in absence is therefore the time for us to assume our own responsibility. Without taking hard and fast positions, we accept, in faith and in hope, the risk of giving new answers of life's ever-new questions. The Spirit demands that we take this risk.

HOW I FOUND HOPE IN A SEASON OF DEPRESSION BY: NATHAN RUMOHR



I have suffered from depression probably my whole life but was first diagnosed when I was 20. In 2013 I had my worst depressive episode lasting for probably two years. I was not only dealing with my medical condition of depression but also felt the betrayal of God to let me fall into such despair. Needless to say, I was very angry with God.

The pain and sorrow of that darkness made me feel worthless and I felt there was no reason to live.

Over time, I got a lot of counselling, support from my girlfriend (now wife) and family. I was prescribed medication that has balanced me out to this day. It was a painful 2-year process but the support got me through the most severe depths of depression.

But there was something still holding me back. I was honestly trying to move on with my life but that feeling of abandonment and loss of trust in God still lingered.

During those two years, I was still going to Mass. One day, Father Justin Huang invited me to Faith Studies after he greeted me after Mass. He invited me while in line, in front of a lot of people. I didn't necessarily want to go but I am the kind of person who likes to take on a challenge so I said yes.

The first few sessions didn't really connect with me. I kept my distance from the studies, finding them very basic and superficial. But then week five of the study changed me.

It was the lesson focusing on Revelation 3:20 and the description of the painting Heart's Door by Warner Sallman. In that painting, Jesus is knocking at a door with no doorknob. Only the person inside can let Jesus in.

Something in the lesson opened me up and made me realize God's love for me. He hadn't abandoned me but was waiting for me. I then realized that I hadn't wanted Jesus in. I wanted to remain angry.

It's not the rules or commandments that drove me away from Christ, it was because I wouldn't let Jesus in to love me, suffer with me, triumph with me, mourn with me, and show me a version of myself I couldn't even imagine, the self that God knows we can be and designed us to be.

That week, I decided to let Jesus in and help gut out the anger and resentment. It wasn't quick but it was the beginning of Him working out a lot in my heart.

God broke down fear, and gave me hope, hope that the God of this universe through the sacrifice of His Son Jesus Christ makes us all worthy of love, that we are all justified and counted. For me, going through that Faith Study was the door that allowed me to accept Christ's love without reservation.

Since then, not only has my relationship with Christ deepened, I've seen my faith study companions being transformed as well.

No longer were they just "nice men" who came to Mass every Sunday, but they were now leaders that attracted other young men to their presence. They engaged with visitors and were not afraid to have difficult conversations. They were first to volunteer and leaped into the journey with all that wanted accompaniment. This particular group further convicted my faith and showed me how to live the faith practically as a husband, father, and leader.

We all experienced our identity in Him. We were changed when we accepted His love.

God will change your life if you let Him.

JESUS SPEAKS THROUGH HIS APOSTLES: THE SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER BY GAYLE SOMERS



Gospel (Read Jn 14:23-29)

In a long section of St. John's Gospel that we call "the Last Supper Discourse" (see Jn 13-17), Jesus begins to anticipate His departure from this world and what that will mean for His friends, the apostles. He emphasizes that to love Him means to live as He taught them. Those who love Jesus in word and action will live in communion with the Trinity here on earth, even before they reach heaven.

Then, Jesus moves on to describe something that is yet to happen and is of vital importance as we seek to understand how His followers will know what they need to know about Him and His Word after His departure. How will the Gospel move from this band of apostles and those who traveled with them into all the world? Once Jesus leaves, how can we know we have the truth about Him and thus be able to live it?

Jesus has a plan to make sure all those who wish to follow Him, in all the years that must pass before His return, will know what they need to know: "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My Name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you." If we have read the Gospels carefully, this promise by Jesus has to bring some relief. We have seen how little the apostles actually understood of what Jesus said and did while He was still with them. Notice that this promise is made uniquely to the apostles in this conversation. Jesus switches from speaking about "whoever" (all believers) in vss 23-24 to "you" (the eleven who were with Him at the Last Supper) in vss 25-29. We can understand by this that although the Holy Spirit will be sent to all believers, He will do a particular work of teaching and reminding the apostles. Later in this same discourse, Jesus tells the apostles that the Holy Spirit will "guide you into all the truth" (Jn 16:13). This is an even more expansive promise, because it anticipates that the apostles will, in the future, need to know more than they did on this night. In all this, the work of the Holy Spirit is of supreme importance. Jesus knew that He had chosen mere men upon whom to build His Church. The worldwide proclamation of the Gospel, through all the ages of the Church's history, would have to come through ordinary flesh and blood. How could this be anything other than risky? There is only one way: a supernatural charism of the Holy Spirit, working in the apostles and their successors, would guarantee "all the truth."

Because of this magnificent promise, Jesus can leave His apostles with "Peace." How is this peace different from what "the world gives"? Peace in the world depends on circumstances. The peace of Jesus goes much deeper than that. His peace grounds us in the truth of God's love and power, no matter what our circumstances might be. How can we be sure of this truth? We look to these promises right here. The charism given first to the apostles and then passed on through the laying on of hands to their successors enables us to know "all the truth," expressed now in both Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

What an incredible plan! Did it work? Our first reading gives us the evidence we need to answer this question.

Possible response: Lord Jesus, please help me love You in ways that go beyond words and emotions.


