GOSPEL REFLECTIONS FOR THE ASCENSION BY: GAYLE SOMERS



FIRST READING (READ ACTS 1:1-11)

The first verse of this reading tells us that its author, St. Luke, wants to continue a story he began in his "first book," the Gospel of St. Luke. That book was devoted to a careful account of "all that Jesus did and taught until the day He was taken up" (Acts 1:1). This book (Acts) will show us how Jesus could both depart from and yet remain with His followers. The lesson begins with today's reading.

We remember that even before His Passion and Resurrection, Jesus promised the apostles that Someone Else was coming. Now He tells them explicitly not to try to get started on their mission to "all nations" right away. They must wait for that Someone Else: "John baptized with

water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 1:5). The apostles' first question about this event revealed them to be focused on the wrong thing (again): "Lord, are You at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" (Acts 1:6). It was not unreasonable for the apostles to be curious about the restoration of the kingdom to Israel, as this was a Messianic hope of long-standing for the Jews. Notice that Jesus doesn't rebuke them for their interest in David's kingdom, but rather for their desire to know when it will happen. Jesus wants them instead to focus on their own work of being His witnesses: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, through Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Ironically, this work He gives them will actually bring about the restoration and fulfillment of the kingdom they earnestly seek. In due time, they will learn that this kingdom, as Jesus had told them earlier, is not of this world. The kingdom Jesus rules is not ethnic; it is not confined to the borders of Israel. Through the preaching of the Gospel, Jews of all the tribes of Israel would find their way to it, as would Gentiles. His kingdom is the universal Church, spread out everywhere, "to the ends of the earth."

Then, as the apostles were "looking on, He was lifted up, and a cloud took Him from their sight" (Acts 1:9). What does this mean? It helps to understand the symbolic significance of the "cloud" Jesus entered. It reminds us of the Transfiguration, when we get a glimpse of the glorified Jesus. It reminds us, too, of the "overshadowing" cloud of God's presence in the worship of the Old Testament Tabernacle, filling the Holy of Holies as God and man met. That same cloud of God's presence led the people of Israel to the Promised Land. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI tells us:

This reference to the cloud is unambiguously theological language. It represents Jesus' departure not as a journey to the stars, but as His entry into the mystery of God. It evokes an entirely different order of magnitude, a different dimension of being... He enters into communion of power and life with the living God, into God's dominion over space. Hence, He has not gone away, but now and forever by God's own power He is present with us and for us. (Jesus of Nazareth: Holy Week, Ignatius Press, pgs 282-283, emphasis added)

Now we get it! Jesus' departure has only been a departure from our mode of existence. It is not cosmic but metaphysical. That is how He can be gone and yet still with us. In promising the apostles to send the Holy Spirit, He promises not only this new kind of presence with us but also a share in the great power of which He spoke in the Gospel reading. Did the apostles grasp this?

Not exactly. We see them staring off into space, probably trying to take it all in. Two angels caution them against "standing there looking at the sky" (Acts 1:11). Jesus has ascended into His rightful power and authority, having finished His earthly work for our Redemption. The apostles will not have to stare at the sky to see Him return in power (the meaning of the "cloud"). They will see Him return in power very soon—on the Day of Pentecost.

Jesus reigns on His throne now!

Possible response: Lord Jesus, it is a mystery to me how You can be gone and yet entirely present to me always. Help me believe it.

PENTECOST LOOMS AS A REMINDER OF THE HOLY SPIRIT'S POWER AND PRESENCE

As the Church continues to make her way through the Easter Season, she celebrates the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus and prepares for the promised Holy Spirit. It is the waiting for the Holy Spirit that oftentimes gets overlooked. Summer hits, programs and academic years end, and the coming of the Holy Spirit gets eclipsed by the hustle and bustle of life.

The Church, however, keeps pointing us to the coming of the Spirit. In particular, the Sunday Mass readings begin to highlight the promise of the Lord and the forthcoming descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

But who is the Holy Spirit? How are we to understand this Third Person of the Holy Trinity, this promised gift of the Lord Jesus?

The Holy Spirit can be the most mysterious among the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. This is true in large part because the Holy Spirit does not speak of himself. The Lord

Jesus taught us: "When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come."

In our Bible readings this Sunday, Saint John recounts further teachings of the Lord Jesus on the Holy Spirit: "I have told you this while I am with you. The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you."

The spiritual life and our growth in holiness, therefore, begins with the Holy Spirit. As the Lord Jesus also taught us in his public ministry: "No one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God." We need the Holy Spirit, therefore, to know who God is, how we can cooperate with his grace, and how we can be in fellowship with him.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains: "The Holy Spirit is the master of the interior life," and further, "Through the power of the Holy Spirit we take part in Christ's Passion by dying to sin, and in his Resurrection by being born to a new life; we are members of his Body which is the Church, branches grafted onto the vine which is himself."

The Holy Spirit helps us to encounter the living God and re-live the Lord's own Paschal Mystery in our own lives. Such a sharing in the Paschal Mystery begins at baptism. As Saint Peter told the early Church: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

The Spirit comes as a gift. It is the Spirit who dwells within us and is the source of all holiness. The supernatural life cannot be understood or nurtured within us without his presence and divine assistance.

Such a realization helps us to understand the Holy Spirit a little more, but the Spirit moves wherever and however he prefers. He is not bound to anything, not even to baptism or the other sacraments. The Lord Jesus references this movement of the Holy Spirit when he told us: "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit."

As we approach the celebration of Pentecost, it's worth reminding ourselves of the presence and the power of the Holy Spirit.

As we look at our lives and the fallenness of the world, it's good to examine how we are re-living the Paschal Mystery of the Lord Jesus in our own lives. The Spirit moves where he wills, but he respects our freedom. The only force that can restrain him is an obstinate heart.

Our task in this life is to discern the movement of the Holy Spirit and to allow him to work in us and through us.

LETTER FROM FR. JOHN HORGAN

Dear Friends at Saints Peter and Paul,

As many of you know, I have been increasingly unwell over the past few months. I have lost a great deal of weight and have been very fatigued; at first, I attributed this to the general stresses of moving, adjusting to a new home and parish and, perhaps to the general malaise we were all experiencing after so many COVID restrictions.

In late March, though, my Doctor confirmed that I was suffering from low hemoglobin (anemia) due to bleeding ulcers caused by H-Pilori. I began an antibiotics regimen which was very demanding, but which seemed to be the answer to the problem. However, we realized that this did not resolve all the problems.

So, on the 4th of May, I checked into VGH. I went through a number of tests and scans, received all kinds of IV therapy and was treated with the greatest of care. Within a couple of days, I was diagnosed with cancer of the stomach. This is now being aggressively treated through CCABC. I do not yet have a full picture of the treatment or the extent of the cancer, so I cannot answer questions or provide details. I am awaiting more complete medical information and am simply living in Our Lord's Holy Will from day to day. The Archbishop is fully aware of my situation and is wonderfully supportive.

I ask you all to do the same: keep me in your good prayers and ask Our Lord and the Blessed Mother to give me the strength to continue my priestly and pastoral work and enough energy to take up my mission here at Immaculate Conception with joyful commitment. It has been some weeks since I've been able to celebrate Mass publicly, which is my greatest desire.

At this time, I ask you please not to overwhelm the parish office here with phone calls or requests for visits. Until I have a schedule for my chemotherapy – and adjust to it – I am going to be focussed on alternating between increasing my stamina and resting more between activities


