The Sacrament of Baptism:

SUNDAY JULY 6TH 2025 READINGS: FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In Luke's gospel the mission of the seventy-two disciples takes on a double significance. On the one hand, it demonstrates that the proclamation of the kingdom is not the exclusive task of the Twelve. On the other hand, for the Jews of Jesus' time, the number 72 functioned as a symbol for the total number of the Gentile nations. It is not by chance that at various times on His way up to Jerusalem Jesus preached salvation to the Gentiles.

The seventy-two disciples confidently set out to conquer the world. We get a glimpse here of the driving force of Christian preaching inspired by the experience of the wind of Pentecost. Paradoxically, the most stable element in Christianity is the command always to go forward.

The goal of apostolic ministry consists not in seeking its own success but in preparing people for personal encounter with Christ. The missionaries are but precursors. It is for Christ that they labor. To pray is to call upon the "immeasurable scope of His power in us who believe" (Eph 1:19).

SUNDAY JULY 13TH 2025 READINGS: FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Jesus recounts an incident of rural violence in order to respond to the question put by a doctor of the Law: "Who is my neighbour?" This juridicist knew very well that the road to life is to be found through love of God and neighbour. Jesus' anecdote bursts open the narrowness of his concern.

An anonymous traveler, savagely attacked and robbed by bandits, is left for dead in the ditch. One after the other, two clerical representatives of Judaism pass by. Neither helps the wounded man; perhaps they think him dead. Contact with a corpse would render them ritually unclean. It is a Samaritan, a man with supposedly little concern for morality or religion who stops. Encountering someone in need raises no casuistic problem for him. It rends his heart. Obeying no voice but that of compassion, he treats the victim as he would want to be treated. The doctor of the Law acknowledges that the Samaritan is the neighbour to the man who fell in with the robbers. It surprises him to find a despised Samaritan identified as the neighbour.

When Christ came to earth, He united Himself with wounded humanity. Like a good Samaritan, He took pity on us. "Go and do the same," becoming neighbour to whoever needs you. Jesus forces us to define our neighbour in terms of the other's need rather than how the other would save us.

SUNDAY JULY 20TH 2025 READINGS: SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In this passage Luke is not opposing two states of life. There are not, on the on hand, contemplative aristocrats of the Christian life, and, on the other hand, the footsoldiers of the apostolic ministry. Jesus' answer to Martha is in no way intended to absolve those who would identify themselves solely with Mary. However, with Martha, occupied by a multiplicity of tasks, Jesus asks only one thing: to listen to His word in order to put it into practice.

All disciples meet the same challenge to balance service and contemplation. Zacchaeus, a model for the Christian disciples, gives half his material goods to the poor (Luke 19:8). The women who follow Jesus "assist Him out of their means" (Luke 8:1-3). Yet contemplation of His word is also demanded of His disciples (cfr. 10:23-24). Nor are women to be restricted only to "women's work." They too, with men, are called to listen to His word.

SUNDAY JULY 27TH 2025 READINGS: SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Lord, teach us to pray as John taught his disciples." The apostles address Jesus as a "master of prayer," asking Him to reveal His secret to them. We also need to know it, "for we do not know how to pray as we ought" (Rom. 8:26).

"Ask... seek... knock." These verbs emphasize the insistence of the call to prayer and the assurance of being heard if we persevere. "You will receive, you will find, it shall be opened to you." Above all, do not become discouraged. Prayer requires a long patience, but through perseverance, it obtains an answer. If earthly parents, with all the faults they may have, give to their children only good things, all the more must our heavenly Father give the most precious good to those who ask for it.

In showing us God's response to prayer, Jesus helps us to understand prayer itself. To pray is not to impose our will on God but to ask Him to make us open to His will. To pray is not to want to change God but to ask Him to change us. For the second petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Your kingdom come," a very ancient variant substitutes "May your Spirit come upon us and purify us."
